With 70 or 80 rescues a year the Team is quickly building up a wealth of experience amongst its members. In 1952, when I joined the Team. I think we had 5 rescues in total that year. This year, 1993, we had 8 rescues in 7 days over the Christmas break and when asked by a reporter "Surely the Team was getting dispirited and weary?" I told him-"not a bit of it, they were just as keen on the eighth rescue as they were on the first," - to which he replied - "Well that reflects great credit on them." I agreed, and said I was very proud of them.

I am proud and privileged that I have had the honour of being team leader for the last 12 years and would like to express my deep appreciation and thanks to my deputies, officers and officials, and all Team members, past and present.

I know the vast amount of time that goes into keeping the Team's affairs running smoothly and the hours spent training, but it all becomes very rewarding and worthwhile when we finish another rescue and know we have helped to ease the pain and anxiety of another climber or walker and possibly even saved a life.

I wish my successor the same goodwill and co-operation that I have always had and advise him that Keswick is not a team that needs leading, just encouraging once in a while.

Lastly I would like to pay tribute to all team members wives, especially my wife Val, for her support and forbearance over the last forty years. I've lost count of the times our social life has been disrupted, but she always recognised the importance and urgency of Mountain Rescue.

Mike Nixon has been a member of the Keswick Team for over forty years and Team Leader for the past twelve years having taken over from George Fisher.


Mike has become a well know face in the local community and in the mountaineering world in particular. He worked for many years in George Fisher's shop and more lately at a local outdoor centre.

Training Report

The development in Team training has continued through 1993 with further consultation taking place between the Lake District Teams. The focus of this has been the Rescue 2000 study which has placed training as the top priority for the future of Mountain Rescue throughout the British Isles.

The computer based logging system has proved very workable and has effectively identified training needs both for the Team in general and for individuals in particular. This invaluable aid will greatly assist as we strive to take the standards of competence even higher in the future.

First Aid training for the Team has taken a significant step forward with an extensive programme of instruction being run over the winter months by Dr Peter White and Dr Will Ponsonby. This scheme will conclude with an inter team training weekend and final exam.

The fundraising effort has required a short break in the training programme but the weekly sessions have now resumed. The provision of a new headquarters will provide a boost for Team training which is currently held in cramped and unsuitable accommodation.

Equipment Report

1992 saw us doubling up and upgrading much equipment, giving us two fully equipped lead vehicles. On most incidents one lead vehicle and our Transit attend, leaving the other fully equipped vehicle to attend any other incidents that may occur.

Whilst 1993 has not seen such an outlay the cost of maintenance etc, remains considerable. There are also ongoing replacement costs, many items of equipment having a limited life, ropes, slings, harnesses, etc, deteriorate whether used or not and are replaced, at the latest every three years.

On the subject of maintenance, our present base facilities are becoming increasingly inadequate for our present escalating workload. For instance, try drying a casualty bag, two 600 foot ropes, a couple of 300 foot ropes, several sacks and their contents, in a room with one storage heater, that is also the control room. Indeed it is the only room except for the unheated garages. You may begin to appreciate the problem.

Incident Report 1993

1	3 January 14:40	Wythburn	A man, a member of Teesdale MRT, slipped on ice and broke his tibia and fibula. The alarm was raised by radio which was picked up by Langdale/Ambleside MRT.
2	15 January 13 .54	Green Gable - saddle into Gillercombe	A man was blown over by a severe gust of wind. He broke his leg in the process
3	24 January 16.12	Langstrath junction with Greenup Gill	A man slipped on wet rock and broke his right tibia and fibula. Wet and windy.
4	8 February 20.00	Sty Head - Corridor Route	A young couple were last seen heading towards the Corridor Route to Scafell Pike from Sty Head at 14.30 hours with only a line drawing for a map. They were found benighted near Taylor Gill force at 2300 hours.
5	13 February 14.45	Crag Hill	Man (47 yrs) collapsed and died from a heart attack. Dry, overcast weather.
6	17 February 16.50	Nethermost pike High Crag	A woman slipped and broke her ankle.
7	25 February 14.15	Glaramara - Tarn at Leaves	A youth (20 yrs) from an outdoor centre reported to be suffering from hypothermia. He managed to walk down with the team.
8	9 March 19.00	Latrigg	Request to assist with youth who had fallen off his mountain bike, dislocating his shoulder. He was taken by car to hospital by his friends, as the team arrived.
9	21 March 11.25	Rosthwaite- Stonethwaite path	Man (46 yrs) reported unconscious on path. It transpired that he was a former epileptic. He was lying in a stream with minor head injuries and a broken humerus.
10	30 March 13.57	Causey pike - top of Stonycroft track	A man (20 yrs) was blown over by the wind. He damaged his knee.
11	4 April 12.28	Castle Crag - Millican Dalton's Cave	A woman (59 yrs) slipped on wet grass and broke her tibia and fibula.
12	3 May 16.46	Black Crag - 'Troutdale' Pinnacle MS	A boy (14 yrs) was leading the first pitch with his father. He fell 30'- 40' and sustained an injured arm, abrasions and contusions to his abdomen.
13	4 May 15.04	Blencathra - Glenderamackin valley	An elderly lady (70 yrs) broke her ankle.
14	9 May 19.00	Cat Bells	A couple (29 yrs) were reported overdue from a walk over Cat Bells, last seen on the summit at 1430 hours. They turned up as the team was commencing the search.

1	15	11 May 21.27	Cat Bells	A fisherman in a boat on Derwentwater reported seeing a paraglider making forced landing and calling for help. A thorough search was made but no clues were found.
1	16	12 May 16.30	Blencathra - Sinen Gill	A local woman (58 yrs) had bee missing from home in Keswick for 5 days. A extensive search of the Skiddaw and Blencathia area was made by the team, search dogs and an RAF helicopter. She was located by the helicopter but found to be dead. Probable suicide.
	17	14 May 14.20	Glaramara - near Hind Crag	Three walkers diverted in poor weather from Glaramara summit to Grains Gill. One of them slipped and ended up in a ravine with a broken leg, badly lacerated scalp and hypothermia. Assisted by Cockermouth MRT, Penrith, SARDA and RAF helicopter.
	18	14 May 15.00	Skiddaw	A man suffered a fatal heart attack whilst walking in poor weather conditions and unseasonal snow cover. He was recovered by RAF Boulmer with assistance from Cockermouth MRT.
	19	25 May 17.12	Sty Head Path	A woman broke her ankle near Sprinkling tarn but managed to get some way down with assistance before calling out the team. She and her husband were doctors.
	20	25 May 21.00	High Spy area	A 4 day search for a man (67 yrs), last seen in the Rigg Head Quarries area, indicating his route as being over High Spy. An intensive search involved 7 Teams, SARDA and RAF Boulmer. Found dead by RAF Leeming MRT on Dale Head.
:	21	30 May 17.55	Rosthwaite - Watendlath path	A girl (16 yrs) in a D of E group slipped and injured her ankle. She was taken to Keswick Cottage Hospital with mild hypothermia and exhaustion.
	22	1 June 11.15	Blencathra - Sharp Edge	A girl (17 yrs) in a large group slipped and fell 120'. She sustained a fracture/dislocation of her thoracic spine but no damage to her spinal cord.
2	23	12 June 16.24	Shepherd's Crag 'Jaws' E1 5b	A climber fell from the top of the climb pulling out his runners but was held as he hit the ground. He sustained a broken arm, cuts and bruises, but his helmet saved his head and possibly his life.
-	24	30 June 13.17	Launchy Gill, Thirlmere	A party of 3 were scrambling up the top waterfall when a boulder about 1m square came loose. One scrambler fell about 20' and sustained a broken leg and facial injuries.
	25	15 July 13.50	Sty Head Tarn	A girl (14 yrs) in a school party had asthma attack. She was carried down by the team.
2	26	17 July 13.15	Blencathra - Sharp Edge	A boy (13 yrs) in a youth group slipped and fell over 100' down a gully to the foot of the Edge. A helicopter on exercise in the area assisted the Team in his immediate care. He was airlifted to Carlisle Infirmary with head and spinal Injuries.
2	27	20 July 00.04	Barrow	Campers at Braithwaite reported a flashing light for over an hour. Investigation found 4 campers on the ridge.
2	28	21July 14.13	Walla Crag- Cat Gill	A young man (19yrs) slipped while descending and dislocated his knee.

29	26 July 16.45	Helvellyn - Wythburn path	A woman (55 yrs) slipped and broke her ankle.
30	1 August	Mill Gill, Thirlmere	A woman slipped and fell about 40' into the gill, sustaining a broken pelvis and tibia and fibula. She was airlifted to hospital.
31	2 August 19.30	Derwentwater shore near Lodore	Request to assist ambulance crew to assist with large man who had slipped from the duckboards on the path and broken his leg.
32	3 August 14.20	Watendlath	Request to assist the ambulance crew with a lady with a broken ankle.
33	3 August 21.00	Walla Crag	A man slipped on wet grass and broke his ankle.
34	6 August 15.35	Bowder Stone	A man slipped and fell off whilst scrambling, sustaining a broken ankle, cuts and bruises.
35	12 August 14.49	Crippen Plantation path Grange to Honister	A woman (45 yrs) slipped and broke her ankle.
36	13 August 14.00	Great Gable	A man slipped on scree, injuring his head and back. A Team member at the scene, assisted by other walkers, used the Sty Head stretcher and carried the man to Seathwaite.
37	14 August 16.15	Latrigg	A man fell off his mountain bike and knocked himself out.
38	15 August 18.10	Latrigg	A man (41 yrs) made a bad landing with his paraglider and broke his ankle.
39	17 August 16.10	Dock Tarn	A woman fell on the pitched path and broke her wrist.
40	23 August 23.00	Central Fells	Two men and a woman were reported overdue from a walk over Green Gable, Great Gable, Scafell Pike and Glaramara. They turned up at 00:50 safe and well.
41	24 August 12.45	Skiddaw House	Request from the police to check Skiddaw House by Land Rover for a missing soldier.
42	27 August 13.43	Grains Hill	A man was taken ill with chest pains. He was taken by helicopter to West Cumberland Hospital.
43	28 August 14.20	Skiddaw - Carlside summit	A boy (10 yrs) collided with a cairn and badly gashed his knee.


44	29 August 01.20	Dalt Wood, Borrowdale	A group of youths making their way along the river bank from Rosthwaite to Hollows camp-site with no torches after a night in the pub. One man fell and injured his leg but was in no condition to be detained in hospital.
45	29 August 12.44	Cat Gill, Walla Crag	A party of 7 children and 3 leaders, with no safety equipment. 2 children slipped whilst trying to climb out of the top of the gill. They were both carried down with minor leg injuries.
46	8 September 23.55	Honister - Scarth Gap	2 women on the Coast to Coast walk failed to turn up at their accommodation in Borrowdale. They were located at Black Sail, Ennerdale.
47	19 September 17.50	Great Gable - Aaron Slack	Whistles had been heard by walkers descending Aaron Slack. The report was investigated but nothing was found.
48	21 September 15.50	Rigg Head Quarries	A girl (16 yrs) slipped and injured her hip.
49	23 September 17.25	Glaramara summit	A man (60 yrs) had slipped and fallen on the rocky summit dislocating his shoulder. He was carried down and transferred to Carlisle hospital by ambulance.
50	24 September 17.41	Sty Head	Some passers by reported a person to have injured her knee at Sty Head. However, the injured person was found walking into Seathwaite as the Team was setting off.
51	25 September 13.20	Castle Rock, Thirlmere	A request from Ambulance Control to assist in the recovery of a climber with head injuries, having fallen 15 feet. He had recovered sufficiently to walk down to the waiting ambulance - with shoulder injuries - as the Team arrived.
52	30 September 15.43	Borrowdale - High Scawdel	A women (40 yrs) slipped and fell, sustaining knee and hip injuries.
53	6 October 14.27	Barrow	A man (60 yrs) slipped and fell, sustaining a badly broken ankle.
54	13 October 15.37	Dale Head	A women (51 yrs) slipped on wet grass and broke her ankle.
55	17 October 14.45	Watendlath - Cowgate	A Dutch woman (62 yrs) slipped on wet grass and broke her ankle.
56	17 October 14.45	High Rigg	A women (69 yrs) slipped on frozen grass and broke her ankle.
57	17 October 14.45	Carrock Fell	A man suffered a fatal heart attack when climbing up the fell. As the team was already engaged on the previous two simultaneous callouts, this was passed on to Penrith and Patterdale MRTs
58	18 October 00.07	Raven Crag - Corvus	7 climbers were reported overdue. It was a cool, frosty night and there may have been ice on the crag. The climbers turned up safe and well as the Team was setting out.

59	18 October 13.40	Latrigg	A women (60 yrs) slipped on wet grass and broke her leg.
60	24 October 18.20	Great End - Cust's Gully	A man was heard shouting for help by passing walkers and a camper at Sprinkling Tarn. When the Team arrived, the man had extricated himself from the icy gully, but had no tourch to walk down. He was escorted down by the Team.
6	26 October 12.05	Maiden Moor	A man (54 yrs) collapsed whilst walking. Another walker with a mobile phone called for help. The man was found to be dead on arrival of the Team.
62	2 1 November 18.15	Langstrath - foot of Stake Pass	A 19 stone man sustained an ankle injury near the foot of Stake Pass in Langstrath. He was carried to Stonethwaite with difficulty.
63	3 November 14.57	Littledale Tarn, Newlands.	A woman slipped on wet grass and broke her ankle.
64	1 6 November 16.32	Great End	A man and a woman met up on the summit of Great End after becoming lost in poor visibility. The two became cragfast after he led her 250' down the crag face. He then called for help using his mobile phone though he did not know where he was. The two were taken off the crag with some assistance from RAF Leeming MRT. A lucky escape.
6	5 9 November 19.45	Scafells	A solo female French walker (25 yrs) was overdue on a walk to the Scafells. A search well into the next day involved 8 MRTs, search dogs and a helicopter. She was located at Mickledore with fatal neck injuries, having sustained a fall.
66	3 10 November 13.00	Cat Bells above Manesty	A woman (70 yrs) slipped on wet grass and broke her ankle.
67	7 13 November 13.42	King's How	A woman (40yrs) slipped on wet grass and broke her ankle.
68	3 20 November 15.56	Glaramara - Allen Gill	A man (34 yrs) slipped on wet grass whilst descending steeply into Grains Gill. He broke his right leg.
69	4 December 15.37	Grains Gill	A man (34 yrs) slipped and broke his upper tibia and lower fibula.
70	5 December 17.00	Blencathra - Sharp Edge	A family with young children reported to be in difficulty on Sharp Edge. The team found the group descending in the dark with help from other walkers.
71	27 December 16.45	Blencathra - Gategill Fell	Three walkers were reported to be cragfast. A search was made but nothing was found. False alarm with good intent.
72	27 December 17.20	Maiden Moor - Cat Bells	Two red flares were reported. A search was made of the mountain side. It was then discovered that a local person had been letting off fireworks.


73	28 December 18.12	Langstrath - head of valley	A woman (45 yrs) slipped on snow on a flat path and broke her ankle. Her husband and younger son returned to Langdale to raise the alarm.
74	29 December 22.40	River Greta - Forge Lane Bridge	A request was received by Ambulance Control to assist with the recovery of a woman who had thrown herself down a bank near the river. Apart from being confused, she was otherwise alright.
75	31 December 14.05	Grey Knotts	A boy (14 yrs) had been jumping off rocks into snow drifts. He broke his lower tibia and fibula.
76	31 December 15.48	Base Brown	A man (24yrs) broke his leg when it went down a hole in the snow. He was lowered down in difficult conditions. BAF Legning used flares to illuminate the evacuation


Keswick Mountain Rescue Team Search Dog Involvement in Incidents outside the Local Area

	1 13 February	Kirkby Stephen MRT	Two walkers became benighted when attempting to cross Dufton Fell, and were reported missing by the local Youth Hostel. Two Keswick dogs and their owners attended, but the party turned up before they were deployed.
2	2 ° 20 March	Langdale/ Ambleside MRT	A husband and wife separated from their party of six to walk slowly to Kirkstone Pass Inn from Threshwaite Mouth, above Patterdale. They failed to arrive. Three Keswick dogs and their owners and three other team members assisted in the search which lasted for twelve hours. In the dark and driving rain the couple had completely reversed their route, and were eventually found outside the search area. The husband was found first, and although severely hypothermic and distressed, was able to direct the searchers to his wife, who sadly died of hypothermia on the north side of The Knott.
3	3 13 June	Kendal MRT	A male epileptic was reported missing in the Levens area. One Keswick dog and its handler attended. The casualty was eventually located in Barrow, having got on the wrong coach.
4	30 July	Kendal MRT	A 40 yr old male was reported missing in the vicinity of Humphrey head. One Keswick dog and its handler set off to attend, but the body of the missing person was located while they were on route




SUMMARY OF INCIDENT TYPES




