Chairman's Report

Compared with the previous year, when fundraising was rampant and the new HQ was being built, and opened, 1997 was a doddle.

There has been an inevitable "fine tuning" period with the new building, and how we work from it; we have made some detail changes within the building, such as adding more racking and shelving to the drying room, small modifications in the kitchen and Control Room, and in particular, developing the rope training area with belays, climbing wall holds, and a belay ledge for stretcher lowering. The majority of this work has fallen to Team members, and has been tackled with enthusiasm and commitment by a dedicated group.

Financially, it was inevitable that the level of donations would fall at the end of the Appeal, and this has indeed been the case. However, the financial standing of the Team is reasonably healthy. Collecting Box donations have held up well, and in this regard, it is worth mentioning that Brian Martland, our Collection Box Co-ordinator, is standing down this year after 6 years of hard work. Brian has overseen the collection of some £55,000 worth of loose change during his period in office, and I would like to publicly acknowledge the enormous effort that he has exerted on behalf of the Team.

We decided as a Team that the next major project must be the replacement of our ageing Ford Transit ambulance, with an up to date turbo diesel version, and this will be paid for out of our existing funds with further assistance from our friend and benefactor, Mrs Ada Hillard. I have opted to stand down as Chairman this year, as I feel the need for a change. I am to take over the Secretary's post, from which Pete Barron is standing down. Pete has worked tirelessly for the Team during his period of office, and will continue as a Deputy. Our thanks go to him also.

As usual, it would be remiss of me not to acknowledge all of our various suppliers, supporters and benefactors for their interest and continued support in all sorts of ways; I thank you on behalf of the Team.

Team Leader's Report

1997 - the quietest year for callouts since 1991 when there were 62. This year has seen 67 rescues with 3 fatalities. Rescues have varied from lower leg injuries, callout duration often less than one hour, to complicated, strenuous rescues at night in hostile conditions lasting up to 5-6 hours. 13 searches have been carried out during the year with team members involved in these searches being on the hill, in some cases, for over 12 hours. These searches are mainly at night and often in foul weather.

No matter what the incident, the Keswick Team, through its varied and intensive training, responds with skill, professionalism and a sense of humour where appropriate to relieve the worries of a casualty and other members of their party. It is a tribute to the enthusiastic training officers of the team that they have put together such varied training and have been able to enlist the services and skills of other team members to assist.

A number of officers of the Team have decided to step down this year, among them Mick Guy as Chairman, Pete Barron as Secretary, Brian Martland as Collecting Box Co-ordinator, Chris Strutt as Training Officer and Keith Stephenson as Base Officer. On behalf of all Team members, I thank them for all the work they have carried out for the Team whilst in 'office'.

Our thanks go, as always, to: All Team members, their wives, husbands and families. Team members employers for allowing time away from work. All our friends, supporters and benefactors and the local community for their suppoprt and encouragement. Our thanks also go to the RAF helicopter crews for their help on 7 incidents during the year. Their assistance and excellent flying skills have resulted in the quicker and less stressful evacuation to hospital of seriously injured casualties.

There has been extensive press coverage over recent years regarding the use, and abuse, of mobile phones in the hills. Whilst, yet again, we would stress that they are only additional to, and not replacements for, skill, experience and correct equipment, it is encouraging to note their more responsible use this year. Hopefully this is a trend that will continue. They can, of course save a great deal of time in calling out a rescue team in the case of an accident. It is vitally important, however, that the informant waits in a strong signal area until contacted by the team to collect further information. It is infuriating, when trying to contact a mobile phone in such circumstances, to only be able to obtain a recorded message from an answering service!

This year has seen another increase in the number of sponsored mountaineering events, such as three peaks challenges. Inevitably Scafell Pike is the middle peak on the route and in most cases seems to be climbed at night. We have had several calls for assistance due to such events, however, nowhere near as many as the Wasdale Team. We would stress the need for sufficient numbers of experienced walkers to be in every single group that goes on the hill. These events are no different to recreational climbing and walking albeit they do seem to attract a higher proportion of inexperienced walkers.

1st - 50th Team Practice

On Sunday 7 March 1948 the first team practice took place, during this the founding members lowered a stretcher down Kern Knotts. In celebration of the fiftieth anniversary the Team staged a reconstruction of the first practice.

A stretcher lower was set up on Kern Knotts and a tyrolean traverse (effectively an arial ropeway) was arranged from Napes Needle to Needle Ridge.

However, as increasingly seems to happen during the Teams more sociable occasions a callout, this time on Brund Fell, tied up the members left in Keswick and the practice on Gable had to be cut short to provide extra manpower and to cover the possibility of a second callout.

There have been tremendous improvements in the equipment, communication and transport available to the Team over the years but the founder members would have still recognised the basic process of the vertical stretcher lower which has changed little since 1948 and the Team's stretcher which is still based on the original Thomas.

Training Report

We have continued to send team members to Glennmore lodge for more specialised winter training. In 1997 most of the Team took part in an off road four wheel driving course on the Greystoke Estate.

Our thanks must go to three of the team doctors for running a first aid and casualty care course. Thanks also to the RAF for their continued support in our training.

The enthusiasm of the team continues to amaze us. Not only in its willingness to turn out time after time, but to turn up to the training sessions week after week. However, with all our equipment and modern techniques the job is essentially the same as when the team first started.

	3 January 12:23	Sail Col, Newlands	A man (52 yrs) slipped on ice and broke his ankle. He was lowered down a steep, rocky slope in icy conditions and carried down to a waiting ambulance.
	18 January 13:13	Cat Bells - Yewthwaite Mines	A girl (15 yrs) suffered a dislocated knee cap.
	18 January 17:29	Esk Pike	2 men had become lost and disoriented when on Scafell Pike. They had called in on their mobile phone for advice but were clearly lost. Eventually a search by 2 teams found them on Esk Pike.
4	18 January 22:28	Kinn, Braithwaite	3 separate reports of 4 red flares and torch movements had been seen on Grisedale Pike. A search found nothing. A false alarm with good intent.
5	1 February 19:25	Millican Dalton's Cave, Borrowdale	A man was reported to be suffering an asthma attack. His own inhaler hadn't helped. His crisis was largely over on arrival of the Team and medical support.
6	11 February 20:20	Blea Tarn Gill, Watendlath	A man slipped and fell 7 metres breaking his arm and sustaining facial lacerations.
7	23 February 15:06	Cat Bells	A man (46 yrs) slipped on steep wet grass and broke his leg. His companion went down to the road, flagged down a passing car and went to Keswick MRT HQ only to find it unmanned. He then went to the local police station office which was closed. The local tourist office put him in touch with 999! NB Team members only attend when called out by the police by radio pager. Go to the nearest phone!
8	26 February 17:19	Ashness Fell	A man (28 yrs) became unable to walk after suffering knee problems. He was helped off the fell and taken to the local hospital.
9	1 March 20:15	Scafell Pike area	2 young men had left Wasdale Head at 1.30 pm to climb Scafell Pike, but had not returned. (They had been lost here before!) 7 mountain rescue teams and search dogs spent 12 hours in appalling conditions looking for them. They walked in to Wasdale Head Hotel at 7.45 am.
10	1 March 22:30	Sergeant Crag Gully	5 students from Liverpool were reported overdue from their climb. A search in storm-force winds and torrential rain eventually located them, cold and wet, sheltering behind a wall at the top of Heron Crag. They were escorted down.
11	4 March 15:38	Greenup Edge	A woman (53 yrs) slipped and sustained a scalp laceration. She managed, however, to walk down with a little assistance from the Team.
12	4 March 18:12	Sty i lead	A lone walker phoned in on his cellphone saying he was lost in the mist. The description of his location seemed to be Sty Head. However, he was not found there, but had left a note saying that he was making his way down. He turned up at Wasdale Head and phoned again to ask if anyone was looking for him!

	23 May 17:50	Side of Ullock Pike	A search was carried out involving 2 other teams and a RAF helicopter looking for a missing 32 year old epileptic male. He was found on the road by a police patrol car.

Search Dog involvement in incidents outside the local area

All three Keswick dogs and handlers to assist Penrith MRT in search for missing 71 year old walker on Cross Fell. Found hypothermic the following morning by member of Teesdale MRT.

One dog deployed to Langdale/Ambleside area in search for three missing in Stickle Tarn area. Found by L & A Team member, at Angle Tarn!

7. 26th November (21:30)

Call to assist Langdale/Ambleside MRT in search for missing 64 year old man, lost in Bowfell area. Found by SARDA Lakes dog in Rossett Ghyll area. Three Keswick Dogs attended.

8. December 6th (04:30)

Two dogs and handler's deployed to look for teacher and 9 missing children in Swaledale area. Turned up whilst team were en route.

9. December 22nd (07:00)

Two dogs and handlers deployed to Coniston area, Wetherlam, to search for missing 38 year old man, who had been out overnight in very poor visibility. He was found safe and well at Levers Water by a member of Furness MRT.

Annual Report & Financial Statements for the Year Ended 30 November 1997

Keswick Mountain Rescue Team (hereafter referred to as 'the Team') is an unincorporated association and is established by constitution. It is a registered charity, number 509860.

The main object of the team is for the public benefit, to relieve suffering and distress arising therefrom, among persons and animals endangered by accident or nature hazards within the area of Great Britain and particularly on the mountains of Cumbria and the vicinity of Keswick.

Trustees Responsibilities

Charity law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its financial activities for that period. In preparing those financial statements the Trustees are required to:

- (a) select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently.
- (b) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent.
- (c) state whether the policies adopted are in accordance with the appropriate SORP on Accounting by Charities and the Accounting Regulations and with applicable Accounting Standards, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements.
- (d) prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with applicable Accounting Standards and Statements of Recommended Practice and the regulations made under S44 of the Charities Act 1993. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud or other irregularities.

Treasurer's Report

After several hectic years fund raising for the New Headquarters Appeal and the subsequent construction and equipping of the Headquarters building, 1996/97 was, financially, a relatively quiet year. No new donations were made to the Appeal fund, but interest and income tax refunds amounted to £8,400. Building costs, architect and other professional fees, together with equipment costs totalled £27,893 leaving a balance of £19,325. If no further capital costs arise this account will be closed during 1997/98 and the residue transfer ed to general funds.

The amount of money coming into the general funds (£68,602) was slightly increased from the previous year, no doubt a continued result of our higher profile taken during the Appeal. The most notable increase, and the biggest income maker (£10,219) continues to be the collecting boxes in various premises throughout the town and the surrounding area. Our thanks go to the proprietors of these establishments, and also to Brian Martland, ably supported by his wife Liz, who is stepping down after several years as co-ordinator for the boxes. A significant drop in the number and level of donations was noted during the second half of the year, following the death of HRH Diana, Princess of Wales.

The major item of expenditure (£10,176) was providing all Team members with Goretex suits, enabling them to operate effectively in adverse weather conditions. We are grateful to Berghaus for their technical support and financial assistance with this.

Administrative costs have only increased marginally. As expected communication and Headquarters running costs have risen sharply. The Vodapage call out system cost $\pounds 3,805$, however the Trustees feel this is money well spent, increasing the efficiency of the Team

particularly in the initial stages of a call out. The installation of a third telephone line, mainly for use with the Vodapage and computer systems, led to a 48% increase in telephone costs. This is mainly due to the installation charge. Call charges are not significantly higher. Electricity (£1,060) and security - a new item (£1,374) have added to the Headquarters budget.

Courses is an area where there has been a noticeable increase in expenditure. This is due to most Team members taking part in an off road driving course at Greystoke Castle (£1,586).

To celebrate the Team's 50th anniversary local author George Bott was commissioned to write a short history. This resulted in publication by McKanes Printers of "Call Out: The First 50 Years" at a cost of £3,189. The original idea was not to make a profit, rather to celebrate the history of the Team. However sales to date have totalled £2,064 and we are confident that all costs will be will be covered.

During the year we took a decision to replace our ageing Ford Transit ambulance/personnel carrier. After studying various options it was agreed that the new vehicle should be another Ford, again fully equipped as a four wheel drive ambulance/carrier. A deposit of £2,000 has been paid, the remaining cost is expected to be about £40,000, and has been provided for in the balance sheet. The vehicle should be ready for delivery in April 1998.

There is no other significant expenditure anticipated for 1997/98. The trustees are of the opinion that sufficient funds are available to enable them to meet any demands that may fall on them.

The examination was not an audit conducted in accordance with Auditing Standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these accounts. Therefore, our examination does not provide any assurance that the accounting records and the accounts are free from material misstatement.

- (3) The accounts do not comply with the accounting requirement specified in regulation 3 of the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 1995. (Save the requirements specified in paragraph 1 of Part III of the Schedule to the Regulations).

Further to this, no matter has been brought to our attention in connection with our examination, to which attention should be drawn in the report to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.





INCIDENT TYPES 1997









DAYS OF THE WEEK 1997


